(1:33 - 3:01) Introduction and Sermon Setup

Tom greeted the congregation and noted that Scott had worried him that John might have preached the same sermon, encouraging everyone to return that night to hear John's message. The neighbor constantly tries to get the dog's attention. The smell of grilling food makes the dog's mouth water, leading it to tire of its healthy diet. (5:23 - 7:34) God's Adoption and Provision

Many were once like the abandoned dog—lost in sin, mistreated by the world, without hope. In His mercy, God adopted and rescued us through the precious blood of Jesus Christ, not because we earned it. He brought us into His family and provides every good thing: the healthiest spiritual food in His living Word, living water that satisfies the soul's deepest thirst (John 4:14), and protection through a hedge of grace, the fellowship of the church, and the wisdom of His commandments.

God's divine power has given us everything we need for life and godliness (2 Peter 1:3). In the Master's yard, there is real safety, purpose, and deep joy of belonging to the One who loves us perfectly—because He is good, not because we deserve it.

Yet, we often grow tired of the same provisions and stand at the fence, sniffing for something more exciting. We believe the lie that the Master's provision is insufficient and desire what we should not have.

(7:34 - 10:24) Identifying the Neighbor as Satan

The neighbor next door is Satan, the enemy of the soul. The Bible calls him the god of this world (2 Corinthians 4:4), a roaring lion seeking to devour (1 Peter 5:8), and a liar and murderer from the beginning (John 8:44). He does not have our best interests in mind and rarely appears with horns and pitchforks. Instead, he comes with the appealing smell of the grill and small tastes.

Satan's temptations are not always obvious. He appears as an angel of light, deceiving us. What he offers looks good and may seem helpful, but it is junk food of sin—pleasures that feel good for a season but leave us sick and empty. He shows bigger toys like money, success, entertainment, lust, anger, pride, and gossip. He invites us to run with a rebellious pack and roll in the world's filth, much like friends who seem fun but lead to trouble.

The world Satan presents often looks more exciting than the Christian life, which can seem boring or restrictive at times. Partying, sex, drugs, and rock and roll appear appealing, though not safe or right. The devil makes his yard seem far more exciting than the Master's safe, orderly one.

(10:24 - 13:00) The Cycle of Sin and Backsliding

A small opening in the hedge—a compromise, justified habit, wrong relationship, or unsundered corner of the heart—provides the foothold Satan needs. Before long, we backslide and sink deep into sin, spending more time in the neighbor's yard than the Master's. The question is: Who are we getting fed from? Are we feeding on the pure milk and meat of God's Word, or snacking on the neighbor's junk food? Are we listening to the Master's voice or the sizzle of the world's grill?

Scripture describes the disgusting cycle: a dog returns to its vomit, and a sow that was washed

returns to wallowing in the mud (2 Peter 2:22). We are washed clean but quickly roll in the mud again. The dog gets sick, feels guilty, returns ashamed, and is lovingly cleaned and welcomed. Yet the smell from next door draws it back repeatedly. This dangerous cycle is familiar to many Christians, even long-term ones. God always welcomes us back and cleanses us, but we must not take His grace for granted or become comfortable returning to sin, thinking forgiveness is guaranteed.

(13:00 - 16:03) Free Will, Biblical Examples, and Satan's Power

Paul warns against sinning because we are under grace, not law: "What then? Shall we sin because we are not under the law but under grace? By no means" (Romans 6:15). The Christian life requires daily choices, not a one-time decision followed by smooth sailing. God allows Satan to remain next door, granting free will. Without choice, it would be like kidnapping, not love.

Biblical examples abound. In Eden, the serpent tempted Adam and Eve with forbidden fruit they knew they should not have. The Israelites, after deliverance from Egypt, craved their old foods like fish, cucumbers, and garlic (Numbers 11), complaining despite God's provision. Even Jesus was tempted in the wilderness, offered the kingdoms of the world if He would bow (Matthew 4). Satan has power to offer what hearts desire, and yielding leads to abundance in sin.

(16:03 - 19:05) Internal Process of Temptation from James

James 1:13-15 details the internal process. No one should say they are tempted by God, for He cannot be tempted by evil and tempts no one. Each is tempted when carried away and enticed by their own desire. Desire conceives and gives birth to sin; sin, when fully grown, brings forth death.

Temptation begins with thinking about sin. The more we dwell on it, the more it grows, like a child in the womb. Eventually, we commit the act. Continued sin grows until it controls us, leading to addiction where stopping becomes very hard. We must stop sin at its root in our thoughts. The small opening always starts with desire. Satan knows exactly what tempts each person.

(19:05 - 22:11) Practical Steps to Resist Temptation

We cannot remove the neighbor, but we can strengthen the hedge and attune our ears to the Master's voice. First, feed daily on God's Word, making it non-negotiable. Feasting on healthy, nourishing truth makes the neighbor's junk less appealing: "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4).

Second, repair openings in the hedge by honestly identifying weak spots—loss, greed, bitterness, laziness, anger—and bringing them to God in prayer, confessing to faithful brothers or sisters, and building accountability. "Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation" (Matthew 26:41).

Third, respond quickly to the Master's call. Run to Him without delay. His arms are open; He washes us clean and gives fresh starts, as in the prodigal son parable where the father ran to embrace his returning son (Luke 15:20). There is more joy in heaven over one repentant sinner than over ninety-nine who need no repentance.

Fourth, love the Master more than the neighbor's yard. Greater delight in Him diminishes temporary pleasures. "Submit yourselves, therefore, to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from

you" (James 4:7). Satan must flee when resisted, though he may return with new temptations.

Fifth, stay with the Master's pack—the church family. Stray dogs are less tempting in community. "Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves. A cord of three strands is not quickly broken" (Ecclesiastes 4:12). Strength comes from gathering together.

(22:11 - 24:31) Conclusion and Invitation

Satan, like a roaring lion, targets the weak, isolated, and distracted—those who wander from the pack, lower their guard, or crave something other than the Master's provision. Stay close to the Master, in His yard, with His people.

The neighbor from hell is real and persistent, but our Master is greater. His love is stronger, His yard safer. One day the hedge becomes a wall, temptation ends forever, and we sit at the marriage supper of the Lamb with no neighbor to tempt us.

Until then, choose daily whom to listen to. Like Joshua, declare, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." Refuse the neighbor's scraps and feast on the Master's abundance. Stay faithful in His yard.

If spending too much time next door, sick from junk food, tired, ashamed, and covered in mud, come home. The Master calls your name with wide-open arms, ready to wash, clean, and restore you. If needing to give your life to God, be restored, or seek prayer to strengthen your hedge, come forward as we stand and sing.
